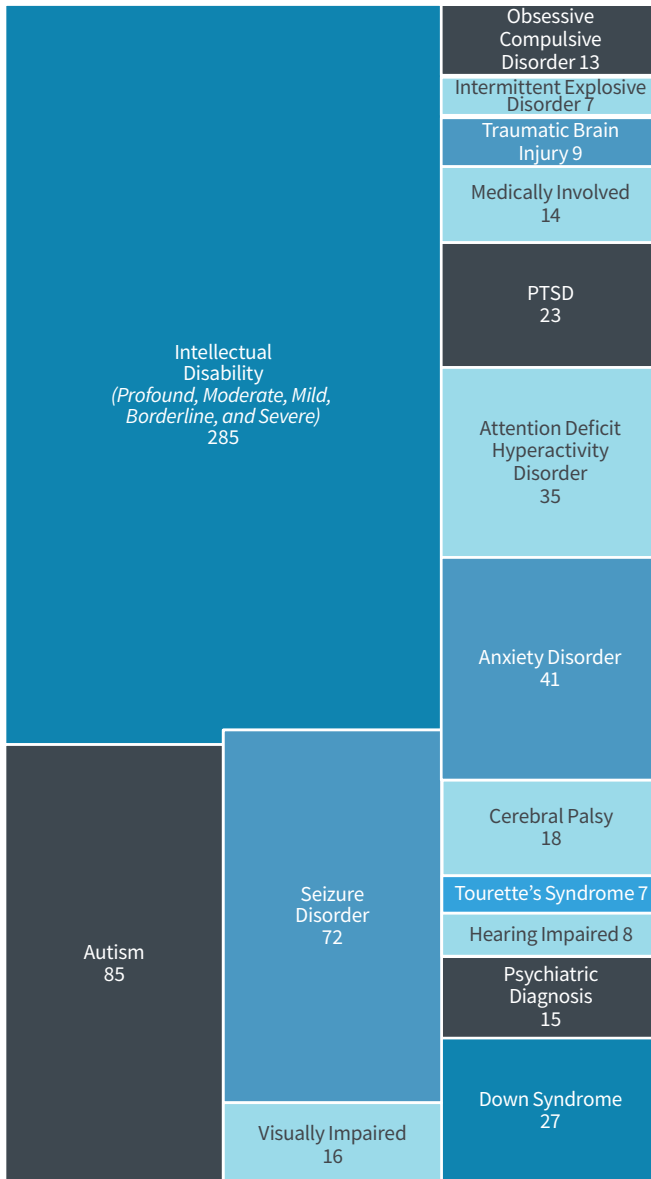

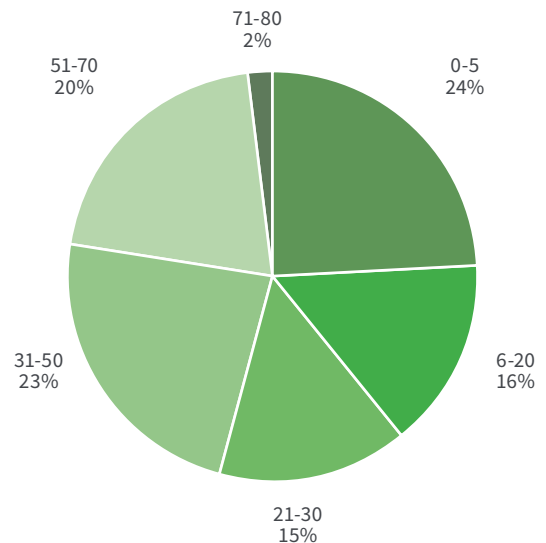
Producing Meaningful Impact

Many individuals report multiple disabilities.

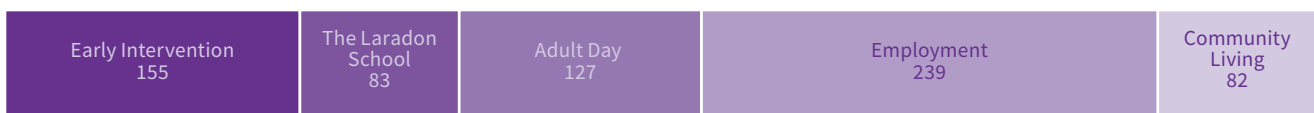


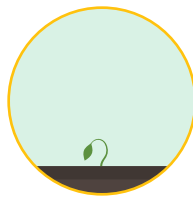
BY AGE

Early Intervention

NURTURING A POSITIVE BEGINNING

For children diagnosed with developmental disabilities or delays, early intervention can be the key to success later in life. The Laradon Family, Infant, and Toddler (FIT) Program provides family-centered therapeutic support for children, aged birth to three, to encourage healthy physical and cognitive development and nurture a safe and loving environment at home.



MEET ISAIAH

When Isaiah was born with a developmental delay, his parents wondered what they could do to support his development and growth, so they reached out to Laradon.

For nearly two years now, Gina Fernandez and Alejandro Corral have opened the doors of their home to Laradon therapist, Sharla Marshall. Sharla visits weekly to help model communication tactics, play strategies, and ways to encourage skill development.

In addition, Gina and Alejandro bring Isaiah to Play-and-Learn Group sessions coordinated by Laradon's Family

Navigator. These sessions provide a time for families and their children to interact with typically-developed children from the neighborhood, encouraging integration and varied skill development.

At first, Isaiah was shy and didn't enjoy engaging with others. Now, he is at the ready with hugs for Sharla! He thoroughly enjoys playing with others, reading books, stacking blocks, and other developmentally appropriate play.

Gina and Alejandro say that Laradon's support has given them perspective. They are more comfortable with Isaiah out in the community and they are confident that he will be well-prepared for preschool — and beyond.

In-home parent education and modeling techniques help the whole family learn how to care for their child and encourage healthy development at an early age.

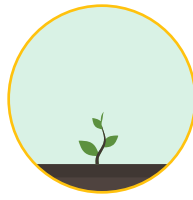
PLAY-AND-LEARN GROUPS

Integrated groups of typically developed children and those with a developmental disability or delay from the local neighborhood play together to encourage development, teach inclusiveness, engage with their community, and allow parents to create a social network.

INDIVIDUALIZED SUPPORT

According to the unique needs of each child, services can include speech therapy, occupational therapy, bilingual services, Early Childhood Specialized Education, assistance with preschool enrollment, and access to community resources.





School Programs

CULTIVATING A SUPPORTIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

Nearly 70 years ago, Laradon began as a school for individuals with disabilities to have access to the same educational opportunities as their peers. This legacy lives on at The Laradon School, where children learn in a supportive environment where their needs, interests, and goals are celebrated with the intent of returning to their local public school.



MEET JULIAN

Julian, who has multiple diagnoses including autism, was first referred to The Laradon School in 2014 because he was having a difficult time at his local public school.

When the 15-year-old experienced any change to his environment—a common occurrence at school—he would become very agitated and his stress levels would oftentimes make him resort to verbal and physical aggression. He was taken out of the classroom so frequently that he was typically spending less than an hour in an actual learning environment. Julian’s family worked with their local school district to seek help from The Laradon School.

With the help of a team of Laradon behavior specialists, a plan of treatment was put into place to support Julian and give his teachers and caregivers the tools to help him succeed. The team spent time discovering what motivates Julian—focusing on his own interests. They worked to understand why he behaves in certain ways. From there, they set up a schedule of positive reinforcements that would appeal to Julian. The team then defined clear, consistent systems that Julian could count on.

It is apparent to everyone that Julian has benefitted from the specialized, individualized support. He is now an active and engaged student in his class at The Laradon School, spending a significant amount of his day in the classroom, learning alongside his peers.

ACADEMICS

Laradon provides age-appropriate educational programming and individualized instruction to address each child's needs and unique abilities, while also meeting Colorado Academic Standards and achievement indicators. Class sizes are small with a teacher-to-student ratio that ranges from 1:1 to 1:3.

BEHAVIORAL SERVICES

Our innovative approach to shaping behavior includes Applied Behavioral Analysis (ABA) and school-wide positive behavior interventions. Laradon's team of certified educational and behavioral specialists develop individualized support plans to help each student maximize self-sufficiency.

THERAPY AND SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Students have access to occupational, speech, and physical therapy as needed. Special programs, like adaptive physical education, music, digital literacy, self-advocacy, and intra/interpersonal skill development promote holistic learning.

PRODUCING AN EMPOWERED COMMUNITY

At Laradon, we value putting people first. It is our intention to support individuals at any stage of their adult life to grow and gain independence, while prioritizing their interests, goals, and unique abilities. The Laradon Adult Day Programs give individuals the opportunity to learn skills, promote self-sufficiency, and engage with their communities on and off of Laradon’s north Denver campus.



MEET RICKY

For many years, Richard ‘Ricky’ Dinges has dreamed of being a truck driver. He has always idolized his brother who drives a truck for a living.

One day, when he was out and about with his group in the Laradon Transitions Program, they saw a large Pepsi truck making deliveries and it made him so happy. From then on, he decided that someday he’d like to drive a Pepsi truck.

He shared this dream with the staff at Laradon, who took it upon themselves to put the wheels in motion. They contacted

the nearby Pepsi bottling plant and asked if they could stop by. Pepsi was more than accommodating, organizing a tour of the plant, a meet-and-greet with a long-time Pepsi truck driver, and lots of Pepsi gear for Ricky to take home. Ricky’s sheer excitement could not be contained that day. It was an exhilarating and inspirational event for all involved.

What is even more remarkable is that ever since that day, Ricky has shown incredible progress at Laradon. He’s transitioned into a higher-functioning day program that allows him even more opportunities to learn, grow, and explore his interests.

FOUNDATIONS

For individuals with significant and chronic needs, the Foundations Program seeks to provide meaningful relationships, therapy, and activities in a safe environment.

TRANSITIONS

Designed to empower people to overcome behavioral and psychological barriers, The Transitions Program helps individuals explore the community at their own pace, with high staff-to-client ratios.

OPPORTUNITIES

In the Opportunities Program, individuals enjoy social, recreational, educational, and volunteer opportunities with their peers in order to maintain optimum levels of physical and mental functioning.

Employment

NOURISHING THE NEED FOR INDEPENDENCE

Laradon provides an opportunity for willing individuals with developmental and other disabilities to obtain, return to, and/or maintain work. A job—and the chance to earn a paycheck—can provide unparalleled opportunities to increase independence and confidence in the pursuit of self-sufficiency.



MEET CATHY

When you ask Cathy Chavez what she likes about her job, she begins listing off all of her duties one by one.

This is not a mistake or a misunderstanding because truly, Cathy loves her job—every part of it. Her work at the ARC Thrift Store five days a week has given her a sense of accomplishment and makes her feel like she is contributing to society. Cathy is very proud of what she does.

A typical day for Cathy begins at Laradon, with employment classes to explore basic work skills, like coming to work on time, staying on task, and practicing good ethics on the job. From there, a crew of three to four individuals loads into the

van to head out to the thrift store. They are responsible for changing out tags, straightening shelves, removing extra hangers, and generally making the store look tidy and inviting to shoppers. Cathy can be seen doing all of these tasks with a permanent smile on her face. She has a reputation for being the most charismatic on the floor.

Laradon job specialists work hard to identify each individual’s abilities and goals in order to find an opportunity that will broaden their horizons. For individuals with developmental disabilities—and all people—a job provides a sense of purpose, accomplishment, and the pride that comes with earning a paycheck.

INDIVIDUAL AND GROUP EMPLOYMENT

Laradon helps individuals find meaningful work opportunities in individual or group settings and supports them with job skills, training, and on-site job coaching.

PREVOCATIONAL AND COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION

Individuals who aspire to work in community jobs can receive specialized instruction and skill development to prepare for employment. Some also enjoy volunteering in the community.

TICKET-TO-WORK

Laradon provides services, including counseling and advocacy to Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) recipients who want to return to work.





Community Living

PUTTING DOWN ROOTS IN A LOVING HOME

Laradon provides opportunities for individuals to become fully integrated and involved in their local communities—this oftentimes begins at home. In the Community Living Program, Laradon works with families and other providers to provide services and support for activities of daily living. Individualized services can include medical or safety support, and social and community skill development.



MEET LINDA

When you walk into the home of Rattu and Robin Merin, you become a part of the busy, loving goings on of the family.

Linda Parker’s life changed exponentially when she joined this family’s home four years ago. Back then, Linda looked and felt like a completely different person.

Living in an assisted living facility where she had little to no activity each day, Linda was overweight, had diabetes, and grew disinterested in participating in any activities at all. When she finally made the move to her current host home, life took on a different hue.

Her Host Home Providers encouraged her to be more active, eat healthfully, and explore her hobbies. Additionally, they

enlisted the help of Laradon’s program manager to work with the doctor to help Linda to take charge of her health. They explored alternative therapies and helped Linda learn to keep track of blood sugar levels and eat accordingly. Eventually, Linda lost weight and was even able to stop taking medications that were causing her physical distress.

Feeling healthier and happier, Linda now enjoys participating in activities like painting, puzzles, and getting exercise. She also helps out around the house with tasks like cleaning dishes and making her bed like every member of a household.

Living with a Host Home Provider has empowered Linda to find the things in life that make her happy and enabled her to be an active member of her community.

HOST HOME PROVIDERS

Laradon coordinates with private families to host individuals in their homes, providing a caring support system, meaningful relationships, and an increased opportunity for independence and community engagement.

FAMILY CAREGIVER PROGRAM

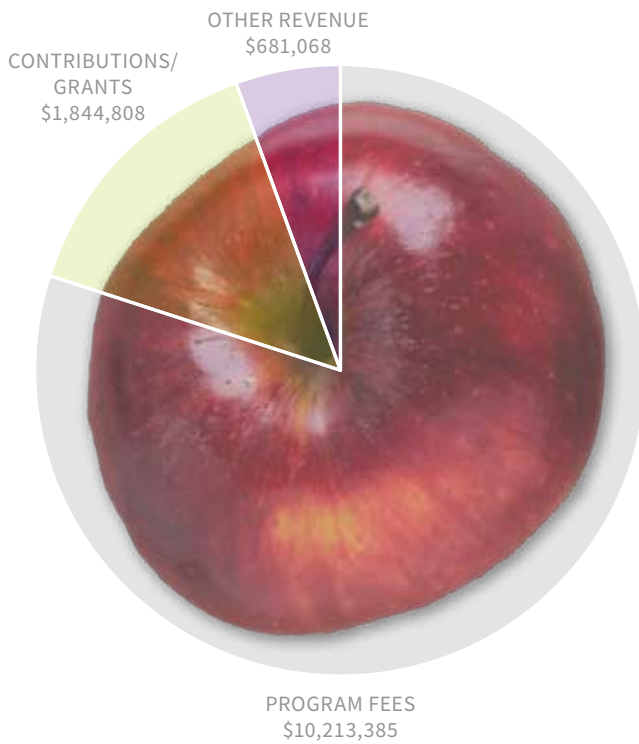
Individuals are able to receive services like bathing, dressing, meal prep, and other supportive services directly from a family member with paid support.
